Thought for the week

As I write this I have just returned from Windsor, where the town is gearing up for the state visit of President Trump. A strong police presence and the barricading of the Long Walk remind us that it was only two weeks ago that one of Donald Trump's staunch supporters was shot dead on an American college campus. The state visit has risks that must be managed, but is also a classic example of the soft diplomacy that this country performs in an almost unique fashion through the work of our royal family.

As Christians, we ourselves are constantly about the work of God's kingdom. We may not see ourselves as diplomats, responsible for the safety of the visitor, or

important in the organisation of international trade and relations, and yet we are. 1 Peter 2:9 says: "But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, in order that you may proclaim the mighty acts of him who called you out of darkness into the light." We too are responsible for ensuring that the message of the Kingdom is shared with as many people as possible, that people are kept safe from harm, and that the lines of communication are kept as open as possible between God and the people around us. We do that by offering opportunities for worship, but also by recognising that when people are worried about what to eat, what to drink, and whether they can pay the fuel bill this winter, then there is not necessarily the space left to think about the things of God, and so we try to support people in that need. We do it too by maintaining good safeguarding practices, and by being as kind and loving and easy to talk to as we know how, sharing that love of God wherever possible.

Ultimately, the circus will move on, the President will return to America, and Windsor will return to its usual daily round. We have no such luxury. We are always ambassadors in the places where we have been set. As such, we have a responsibility to both tell and live God's word to the best of our abilities. May our soft diplomacy achieve, not the easing of tariffs and better trade deals, but the winning of souls, and the sense of hope and love that we have known ourselves in our church membership.

Monday 22nd September - Throughout history, and still today, Biblical scholars are unearthing and researching new and interesting approaches to these ancient texts that have formed and shaped Christianity – and many other religions too! - Today, let us pray for all who carry out study in the name of religion – seeking to share justice, to speak truth, to challenge misunderstanding. May we **learn from them, and from our own experience of the divine – this and every day.**

Friday 26th September - On this day in 1905, Albert Einstein published the papers that introduced his special theory of relativity, which has played a vital part in scientific thinking ever since. Some people have suggested that, if Einstein had not been able to think outside the box and come up with this remarkable concept, all the developments in science over the last 120 years still would not have brought us to his conclusions – he was well ahead of his time! - Today, in your prayers, you might like to focus on prayers of gratitude and courage for all who dare to think outside the box, to reimagine, to pioneer, to invent – perhaps especially within a church context.

Saturday 27th September - Some traditions mark today as the feast day of St Vincent de Paul, a French Catholic priest in the seventeenth century, who dedicated his life to serving those affected by poverty. - Today, let us pray for all who work to tackle poverty, here in our own country and around the world. May we do what we can to join in and strive for justice and equity in our societies and our world.
