

#### All Age Talk

What gadget, game or toy excites you? Is it something new? Is it something that improves your life?

I wonder whether those around you would like to hear you talking about it?

[Give people space to share in groups]

For a couple of years I noticed people started talking about air fryers, they have become a cultural anomaly as the George Foreman Grill defined the 90s kitchen, the Panini Press the 00s, Spiraliser the 10s then the Air Fryer defines the 2020s.

I didn't actually have one at first, people kept on talking about them and eventually, chatting to a friend they admitted they had one, but they had fallen out of favour with it, after a few minutes they offered it to my family for free. So over the following weeks we started using it, experimenting with various foods and ideas, and before long my friend started to ask about what recipes I was making, it would be a regular conversation starter 'what are you making this week?' and not only with my friend but others around me were asking too. Eventually my friend finally admitted that they had now bought a brand new one because we had talked about it so much.

This sort of praise and review is like the good news of Easter, that if we accept Jesus, recognising what he did on the cross and his resurrection – it can really change and transform lives; so much so that others will notice, and as we go about our day to day lives we'll naturally be excitable and chatty about it.

I wonder what do you get excited about? Are there places and spaces where you could get excited about the miracle of resurrection this week?<sup>3</sup>

#### **Reflections on the readings**

93, 49, 14,056 and 1.1

What do these numbers have in common?

[Take some suggestions / guesses]

93 is the number of women who speak in the Bible;

49 is the number of women who are actually named;

14,056 – this is the actual number of words spoken by women in the Bible (they were counted by a group led by Episcopal priest Rev Lindsay Hardin Freeman, in 2014).

and 1.1 per cent – the percentage of the Bible which records women's speech.

Only 1.1 per cent of words in the Bible are spoken by women. I wonder if you have ever noticed that before?

Luke's Gospel tells us that the women who went to the tomb on the Day of Resurrection were given a hard time by Jesus' disciples when they tried to share their amazing news that the stone had been rolled away and Jesus was not there. In verse 11, we read "But they did not believe the women, because their words seemed to them like nonsense."

I wonder what you would have thought if you had been there? Would you have believed the women? Would you have assumed they were being ridiculous and over emotional? Of course Jesus is still in the tomb – isn't he?

[Invite people to spend a few minutes talking to their neighbour about their initial reactions to these questions – what would it have been like if you'd been there?

It was only when the impetuous and curious disciple Peter ran to have a look that he realised that the women were telling the truth.

The reading is joyful – it is an account of the resurrection which spreads out slowly, like light from a sunrise. As we read, more and more is revealed. But it also reflects the culture from which it was written. In that community, at that time, the law said that women's evidence did not even count in a court case. So a woman's testimony was often discounted – as uncomfortable as that may make us feel.

This reading also asks questions of us. Who do we listen to? Who do we trust to tell us the truth? And perhaps the most challenging question, in this world of fake news and misinformation. Who do we believe – and who do we believe in?

[Invite the congregation to have a conversation about the things they believe in. How does the Easter story fit into this list of things?]

Easter Sunday is a day when we roll away the stone of our doubts and say with confidence – Jesus is risen – He is risen indeed – Alleluia!
